## The Heat are on Fire

The Heat are one blowout away from tying the all-time NBA record for most consecutive double-digit wins.

## Phoenix's Elder Statesman

The 38-year-old Grant Hill is averaging 14.3 points per game – his highest mark in four seasons. Hill is bidding to become the sixth player in NBA history to average 14 or more points at age 38 or older.

Averaging 10.2 assists per contest, 36-year-old Steve Nash has a chance to average double-digit assists in a season for the sixth time in his career. All will have come at age 30 or older and would be an NBA record.
